Which Pioneer wagon train took the family west? It's uncertain which wagon train they took but they arrived in Salt Lake early in 1850. David later returned from a mission with the John W. Berry Company. This company left May 10, 1858 and arrived on June 21st.

Any interesting facts or stories that might have been submitted.

- Elizabeth was David's second wife. The first wife was Sarah Piercy (Piersol) in 1836. Then Elizabeth and David married in Feb. of 1844 in Nauvoo, Illinois. Next he married Harriet Dillworth in 1848 and together they had nine children. He married Mary Hillhouse in 1857 but she later left the church and went back east. Finally, he married Olive Lewis and Hilda Matilda Bredesen on Oct. 19, 1867.
- David left Nauvoo and his new wife Elizabeth in the spring of 1844 to serve a mission.
- -Hyrum Smith performed the marriage ceremony for Elizabeth and David. (Nauvoo Marriages, p. 11)

- During their two years of marriage they had one child, Robert H. Brinton who died two weeks after Elizabeth.
- Both Elizabeth and her husband David were born in Pennsylvania. David's next wife was born in Pennsylvania too.
- David was a blacksmith. In 1845 he was called as a member of the 70. (70's record, p. 51.)
- -David served a mission to Europe and was the third bishop of Big Cottonwood, Utah. (Biographical Encyclopedia, p. 85)
- David was one of the first settlers of Parowan Iron County Utah.
